China blames 97 over powder milk scandal

China is to punish 97 government officials over the sale of fake milk powder that caused the deaths of at least 13

babies, the state media says. The officials are accused of "not discovering or fully investigating the problem," the China Daily quoted the Ministry of Supervision as saying.

Thirteen babies from Fuyang city in Anhui died after unknowing parents bought the milk powder which has almost no nutritional value from rural markets.

Nearly 200 infants suffered malnourishment, leading to a medical complication called "big head" disease by local residents.

Investigators uncovered more than 100 factories making bogus formula, consisting mostly of starch and water.

Ireland's mother's are entitled to paid time off to breastfeed their babies at work. New maternity protection laws that have just come into effect, introduce such breaks for mothers returning to work after maternity leave.

"Breastfeeding mothers will be entitled, under the legislation to paid time off for the purposes of breastfeeding in the workplace, where facilities are provided by the employer".

In Korea

An exhibition of breastfeeding posters from all over the world was held for 10 days at the City Hall subway station in Seoul. More than 43 works from 17 countries were displayed. To encourage participation, viewers could vote on their favourite poster by attaching stickers to them. The exhibition will be making its rounds to other big cities in Korea like Daegu and Ulsan. The exhibition was organised by the Korean Committee for UNICEF.

Korea also appoints a Goodwill Ambassador for Breastfeeding, every year to promote the importance of breastfeeding to the general public. The Goodwill Ambassador is normally a celebrity or athlete who has successfully breastfed his/her child.

Dads to learn about babies

A Japanese city council require male employees to take a total of six weeks paid leave before their babies first birthdays and then explain what they learned in a bid to end perceptions that childcare is only a woman's job, officials said.

No male municipal worker in Ota has ever taken leave after having a child, an official said. The requirement will start on Jan 1.

Can you believe uns: Pregnant worker told to wait for lunch break to deliver baby, gives birth at roadside

In Swaziland, a pregnant woman working in a garment factory, felt that she was in labour and asked for permission to leave for the hospital to deliver her sixth child. She was told by her employer to wait another two hours for lunch break before she could go to the hospital. As a result, she gave birth by the roadside, in a standing position.

Instead of making up for the mistake, the company accused her of disgracing it by giving birth by the road-side and she now faces disciplinary action at work.

While waiting by the roadside for transport to the hospital, her labour got intense and she gave birth on the spot. The baby was hurt on the forehead as she landed hard on the concrete slab. Both mother and child were admitted to the Raleigh Fitkin Memorial Hospital.

Breastfeeding May Lower Childhood Leukemia Risk

The results of a new metaanalysis suggests that breastfeeding for even a few months may lower the acute risk of lymphoblastic leukemia (ALL).

A review of 14 studies, conducted since 1988 indicated that infants who were breastfed for 6 months or longer had a 24% reduced risk of ALL. Breastfeeding was also linked with a 15% lower risk of acute myeloblastic leukemia (AML). Breastfeeding for 6 months or less was also protective for both cancers, but to a lesser extent.

The new findings, based on international studies including more than 8000 children with ALL or AML offer a "strong suggestion" that breastfeeding is protective, Dr Marilyn Kwan of the University of California, Berkeley told Reuters Health.

Breastfeeding lowers the risk of common childhood infections which may explain the connection between breastfeeding and the lower leukemia risk, Dr. Kwan noted.

The finding that breastfeeding was also related to a lower risk of AML was "not anticipated on biological grounds". Dr Kwan and her colleagues reported the finding in the November/December issue of Public Health Reports.

Breastfeeding Reduces Risk of Allergic Asthma

The first symptoms of allergy in young babies are eczema and /or gastrointestinal allergies that appear within months of birth and the disease subsequently progresses later to the respiratory mucousa. Thus there is a relentless progression of disease from the skin to the gut to the respiratory mucousa by the seventh year, particularly if there is a high exposure to aeroallergens.

This progression is called the "Allergic March". In the young infant, it is usually the cow's milk given to the baby that causes vomiting, diarrhoea, and colic. Later skin symptoms such as eczema appear with continued cow's milk diet and the introduction of other foods in the diet.

The initial diet of a baby plays a critical role in the development of allergies and asthma. Breastmilk contains many factors that promote the healthy development of the baby. Moreover breastmilk contains many potent factors that reduce the risk for allergy. A very exciting observation more than 25 studies conducted in different parts of the world, show that the intervention with breastmilk for just four months prevented the development of allergies for over five years. Thus the protection against the development of allergies was far beyond the intervention period.

Women who breastfeed are less likely to develop rheumatoid arthritis than women who don't, according to a new report.

"Lower risk of rheumatoid arthritis is a likely additional health benefit of breastfeeding, in addition to lowering the risk of ovarian cancer and breast cancer," Dr. Elizabeth Wood Karlson from Bringham and Women's Hospital Boston, said. - Reuters

Disease-causing microbes found in infant formula and baby food

New Scientist reports from The American Society for Microbiology 104th Annual Conference that baby food has been found to contain worrying levels of disease causing microbes. A bacterium called Enterobacter sakazakii (E. Sakazakii), which has been linked to a handful of fatal outbreaks of meningitis at children's hospitals in US and Europe was of the most concern.

E. sakazakii has been found in powdered infant formula before by a new UK study is the first to detect it in dried infant food.

Premature babies and those with weakened immune systems are at particular risk. Even babies who survive an infection often suffer brain damage says Carol Iversen who studies the bacterium at Nottingham Trent University in the UK. "Very few recover fully," she says.

Iversen and her colleagues have undertaken an extensive survey of powdered infant formula, dried infant food and milk powder

from seven European countries, USA, South Korea and South Africa.

They analysed more than 200 samples from 110

different products for the presence of the bacteria. Eight out of 82 powdered infant formula samples contained stomach bacteria, as did 12 out of 49 dried infant food samples. 13 of bacterial species they identified, including *E. Sakazakii* are members of the Enterobacteriaceae, a family associated with hospital acquired infections.

Powdered Baby Formula - Optimal Media for Bacteria Growth - Expert

A food technologist report that in a survey, samples from 141 cans of infant formula of various brands in 35 countries showed up to 14 per cent were contaminated with the baby-killing bacterium *Enterobacter sakazakii*. The bacteria can live for two years in a sealed can of formula powder but multiply rapidly when mixed up with water for feeding to a baby.

British research has shown that in made-up formula, a population of the life threatening bacteria can double every 10 hours when the formula is refrigerated and every half hour when in room temperature.

A New Zealand premature baby died last month after being fed contaminated baby formula.
