Breastfeeding recommended to protect infants during Swine Flu outbreak

ABA's Core Partner, the International Lactation Consultant Association (ILCA), the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and the United States Breastfeeding Committee have all issued strong guidance which recommend breastfeeding as a critical strategy to prevent infection of the H1N1 swine flu.

The CDC's updated guidance states that, "Infants who are not breastfeeding are particularly vulnerable to infection and hospitalisation for severe respiratory illness. Women who deliver should be encouraged to initiate breastfeeding early and feed frequently". Formula feeding should be avoided or minimilised and breastfeeding maximised.

- If a woman is ill, she should continue to breastfeeding and increase feeding frequency;
- If a mother and infant is too ill to breastfeed directly from the breast, the mother should be encouraged to express and feed her breastmilk to her infant.
- Women can continue to breasftfeed while receiving antiviral medications
- By the time a mother begins to show symptoms of flu, her infant has already been exposed. The mother's milk can provide additional protection for the infant from complications of flu, such as severe respiratory symptoms, diarrhea, other gastrointestinal infections and dehydration.

According to the USBC "Research clearly shows that breastfeeding provides a safe, reliable food source, full of disease-fighting cells and antibodies that help protect infants from germs and illnesses. Mothers exposed to influenza produce specific protection for their infants and transmit this through their breast milk. Infant formula does not provide these specific infection fighting properties. Unnecessary formula supplementation should be eliminated so the infant can receive as much benefit as possible from maternal protective antibodies and other immune protective factors."

Breastfeeding Mothers less likely to develop heart attacks or strokes

he longer women breastfeed, the lower their risk of heart attacks, strokes and cardiovascular disease, report University of Pittsburgh researchers in a study published in the May issue of Obstetrics & Gynecology.

According to the study, postmenopausal women who breastfed for at least one month had lower rates of diabetes, high blood pressure and high cholesterol, all known to cause heart disease. Women who had breastfed their babies for more than a year were 10 percent less likely to have had a heart attack, stroke, or developed heart disease than women who had never breastfed.

"The longer a mother nurses her baby, the better for both of them," said Eleanor Bimla Schwarz, M.D., M.S., assistant professor of medicine, epidemiology, and obstetrics, gynecology and reproductive sciences at the University of Pittsburgh. Dr. Schwarz pointed out. "Our study provides another good reason for workplace policies to encourage women to breastfeed their infants."

The findings are based on 139,681 postmenopausal women enrolled in the Women's Health Initiative study of chronic disease, initiated in 1994.

New growth charts for UK babies


he United Kingdom is still using charts from 1990 which are based on growth rates for formula fed babies. This has caused millions of babies to face the risk of obesity in later life because mums have been wrongly told to fatten them up. Experts say the growth charts gave misleading information about how much milk a breastfeeding mother should grow her child.

New child growth charts are now being introduced to combat obesity and boost breastfeeding rates. The government hopes that the charts will help to reassure mothers who breastfeed that their babies are not underweight.

The old tables were based on the growth of mainly formula-fed babies, who tend to put on weight much faster that breastfed babies. These formula-fed babies also have a higher risk of developing obesity.

The Institute of Child Health's Professor Tim Cole said "with the previous charts, a breastfed baby could be growing perfectly normally but would appear to the health visitor not to be growing fast enough as the charts recommended, so there might have been pressure to wean early".

The new charts are based on the ones developed by the World Health Organisation after a 15-year study of 8500 children from across six countries established firm and in-depth about the growth of healthy children for the first time.



The new charts will be used on all new babies from 11 May with Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland expected to adopt them in coming months.

Australia to pay for 18 weeks paternity leave by 2011



he Federal government of Australia has announced that beginning 2011, primary care givers will be given 18 weeks of postnatal paid leave. The announcement was made on Mother's Day by Treasurer Wayne Swan. The leave will be paid for 18 weeks at the federal minimum wage of about A\$544 a week but will be taxed. The paid maternity leave only covers the primary care giver, usually the mother who earns less than A\$150,000 a year. The scheme is expected to cost taxpayers A\$260 million a year.

Families Minister, Jenny Mackin said the scheme would be "transferable between two parents, which means that it can be shared between a mother and a father".

"It goes to the core of working family life in this country and the fact that we must value the relationship between mum and a newborn child," the Treasurer said.

Premier Kevin Rudd said "paid parental leave is necessary in order to provide extra support for parents with little bubs at home, and secondly, it also helps business productivity in the long-term".

Mums who exercise and breastfeed boost baby IQ

others who exercise during pregnancy are helping to boost their child's IQ, according to research by American psychologist Richard E. Nisbett.

In his new book, Intelligence and How To Get It, Nisbett highlights the important part the mother plays in the shaping her children's ability to learn and reason, starting shortly after conception.

"Children whose mother exercised 30 minutes a day score around 8 points higher in standard 1Q tests than children whose mothers were more sedentary. Breastfeeding for up to nine months may increase IQ as much as six points" he said.

"Exercising large muscle groups increases the growth of neurons NISBETT and adds to the blood supply of the brain. Exercise and breastfeeding combined, he says will raise a typical child's IQ to about 114, which is 14 points above average.

Australian Breastfeeding Association (ABA) ends sponsorship and endorsement agreement with Medela

BA in a statement to its members state that "It is with regret that the Board of Directors of the Australian Breastfeeding Association inform their members that ABA acknowledges Medela's statements, publicly and also in private meetings with Association representatives, that it has, and also intends in the future to breach the World Health Organization International Code of Marketing of Breastmilk Substitutes by advertising and selling feeding teats directly to the public."

"As a result of this and in keeping with ABA's sponsorship and endorsement policy, Medela has breached the terms of our agreement and we have no alternative but to take steps to end our endorsement agreements with Medela. In a position statement dated December 1, 2008 and published on February 11, 2009, the President of Medela, Carr Lane Quackenbush, announced the company's intent to continue with an official policy of WHO Code violation. 

What you can do to promote optimal MotherBaby maternity services?

o you want to increase understanding of normal birth and breastfeeding, and improve the quality of care in all countries? Then consider creating a MotherBaby Network (MBnet). MotherBaby Networks are a result of increased interest throughout the world in supporting the International MotherBaby Childbirth Initiative (IMBCI) and promoting the 10 Steps to Optimal MotherBaby Maternity Services. MBnets consist of individuals such as midwives and physicians; or a collaboration of individuals, community grassroots advocates and organisations, and care providers; or a facility such as a birth center, clinic or hospital where women give birth.

MBnets are an unlimited number of sites throughout the world which, by their own initiative, are using the International MotherBaby Childbirth Initiative (IMBCI) to promote the 10 Steps to Optimal MotherBaby Maternity Services in their own contextual surroundings. These sites have contacted the International MotherBaby Childbirth Organisation (IMBCO) to inform us of their work, completed our online questionnaire, and confirmed their support of the IMBCI. As such, they are recognised by IMBCO as being part of the MotherBaby Network of sites engaged in the promotion of the IMBCI. As a result, they have access to to IMBCO resources and will have the opportunity to share their victories and/or challenges through the IMBCO website. For more information, visit www.imbci.org.


He is a well-known speaker and presented many topics at international platforms in USA, Germany, Australia and middle east countries.

Objectives of WBW 2009


- To reinforce the vital role that breastfeeding plays in emergency response worldwide.
